Syllabus

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This workshop explores “negative space” as a formal, aesthetic, and ethical principle in contemporary poetry and prose. Rather than treating absence as lack, the course examines silence, omission, fragmentation, and restraint as generative forces in literary composition. Students will study how what is withheld, unsaid, erased, interrupted shapes meaning, narrative, voice, and reader experience.

Through close reading, writing exercises, and peer workshop, students will experiment with form, compression, ellipsis, and white space while developing a sustained creative project. Emphasis is placed on revision as a method of discovering what a piece needs less of in order to say more.

ASSIGNMENTS AND EVALUATION

- Workshop Participation (30%): Active engagement through attendance and discussion, this includes weekly drafts and exercises (short-form experiments, free-form: erasure, omission, constraint).
- Rotating Peer-review Participation (30%): Emphasis on listening, precision and constructive critique. Students submit written feedback prior to workshop meetings every week.
- Final Portfolio (35%): 10-15 pages of poetry or 15-20 pages prose.
- Artist Statement (5%): 2-3 pages on revision, narrative, voice, and craft choices.
