COURSE DESCRIPTION

This workshop investigates time as a material of writing. Moving beyond linear narrative and lyric present-tense immediacy, the course explores how poems and prose construct temporal experience through memory, anticipation, repetition, pace, delay, rupture, and duration.

Students will examine how form shapes time and how time shapes voice, subjectivity, and narrative movement. Through generative writing, revision, and workshop discussion, participants will develop work that experiments with temporal structures while cultivating sustained attention to rhythm, pacing, and historical and spatiotemporal awareness.

ASSIGNMENTS AND EVALUATION

- Workshop Participation (30%): Active engagement through attendance and discussion, this includes weekly drafts and exercises (short-form experiments, free-form: pacing, sequencing, temporal tension).
- Rotating Peer-review Participation (30%): Emphasis on listening, precision and constructive critique. Students submit written feedback prior to workshop meetings every week.
- Final Portfolio (35%): 10-15 pages of poetry or 15-20 pages prose.
- Artist Statement (5%): 2-3 pages on revision, narrative/voice, and craft choices.
